Make bridge enjoyable for yourself, partner & opponents.

Give credit when opponents make a good bid or play

• Take care of your personal grooming.

- Ensure that your mobile phone is turned off.
 - Enjoy the company as well as the game.

Remember that it is rude to criticise your partner or opponents in public, to be less than polite at the table, to gloat over good results or object, to a call for the tournament director, or to dispute or argue about a director's ruling, or generally to make any personal and disparaging remark.

Member Profile – Jill Herman

Gathering my thoughts to write this piece has been quite a challenge for me. I don't like to talk about myself much (let me know if I've got that wrong!) and, although on the whole it's been a busy, full and

happy life, there's not a lot to say without boring even myself. My association with the Hutt Bridge Club began in 2001 when I attended bridge lessons with my friend, Ren Davies.

It has proved to be by far my longest stint at any hobby or interest. Bridge and the club mean a lot to me. I have been on several committees and worked at nearly every task in the club from cleaning to working in the office to being President during the difficult COVID pandemic years. I have been fortunate to meet and work alongside many wonderful members over the years and the club is in good heart thanks to you all.

I was honoured to have been made a Life Member at the recent AGM. Now to a little amount of non-bridge backfill information about me.

I'm the eldest of 3 girls – no surprise there, I guess. We were born in Hunterville in the Rangitikei where our father was a country vet. We moved to Palmerston North when I was about 10 and Dad took up a job at the then Department of Agriculture. We then moved to Wellington, settling in Lower Hutt, and I finished my secondary school

education at Hutt Valley High School. I then went on to complete a BCA degree at Victoria University.

After working as a researcher for a sharebroker and then in the finance industry, I did the OE thing and travelled to London, where I lived and worked as a temp accountant and then later in a pub in Scotland. Of course, I travelled around other parts of the UK and to Europe. And, most importantly, I met my future husband there, Grant (a Kiwi also from Wellington!), in a wine bar in London. Where else!

Returning to NZ, Grant and I flatted in Wellington while saving for our first home which we eventually bought in Lower Hutt. After being the Academic Registrar at Wellington Teachers' College, I ended up working again in the finance industry as Assistant Group Treasurer for Petrocorp – the then stateowned petroleum company – this job involved managing huge loans, particularly the associated foreign exchange risk.

Children eventually came along in the form of twins, much longed for but a big adjustment.

We moved from Waiwhetu to Eastbourne when the twins were two and we have lived there in the same house ever since. My focus outside of part time work was then on settling into a new community mainly through joining things involving children. Involvement in the community changed focus as the children got older. I was a member of the Muritai School Board of Trustees for over five years, and I helped establish and run an after-school care facility at the school and then a youth group. In 2011, I was honoured to receive an Eastbourne Community Board Order of Excellence Award for services to Mothers and Young People. During this time I was doing postgraduate university study, and I worked part-time as an accountant, mostly at Parliament and then for an event management company.

I'm now happily retired in Eastbourne. Our son and family live in Melbourne and our daughter, and her family are in Auckland. We have three grandchildren between the ages of 3 and 6 and we try to see them all as often we can.

I took up bridge after returning in 2000 from the Netherlands where we had lived for a year through Grant's work with Shell. I have loved playing bridge, and it was a great shared interest with my father - but not to be with Grant, though he did try and attended our lessons a couple of years ago. However, Grant has been a great support to me at the club - he has also facilitated a couple of planning workshops and water blasted the carpark!

Outside of family and bridge, I'm a member (along with Lesley Haines) of our local Eastbourne community choir. I'm also in a book group that's been meeting monthly for well over 20 years. I was a member of an art buying group for many years and I've continued this interest with Grant – those of you who have been to our home will know that our art collection now outstrips the wall space.

I'm now on to my third big dog – Nellie is an SPCA rescue dog – and she ensures that I get regular walking exercise along our lovely promenade.



A Hand Write-Up From Vil Gravis

Had to include this one for anyone who has had the misfortune to partner the editor with his more hopeful bidding. Occasionally, there is a place, especially with some encouragement from partner. (I don't need much) This time the misfortune was for the opposition. - Editor

When was the last time you (successfully) bid game with a combined nine count? And when was the last time you (also successfully) sacrificed against a cold slam, also with a combined nine count? Both those things could have happened on the very first board of our deal from X-Clubs on Tuesday 25/2/25.



North might open 1D (my choice) though some might open a more optimistic 2C. Over 1D East has two choices of bid: a weak jump overcall of 2S or a Michaels cue bid of 2D. Or, I suppose some Easts might even overcall just 1S. All these bids should tell West that the deal is a freak. If North opens 2C, an intrepid East might still bid 2S. All roads should lead to Rome, but it seems that few did, with most NS pairs ending up in a prosaic 5D, making with an overtrick. But where's the fun in that?

I have great admiration for the EW pairs who launched into 4S, some even doubled, and more so for the one or two who tempted fate by sacrificing in 5S when NS bid to 5D. Tempting fate, because that could well result in NS bidding their slam, but hey! If you're prepared to push opponents into a slam then you should be prepared to either defeat it or bid one yourself. Few pairs, even the more advanced, would take the push to a slam having decided to play in 5D, and in fact only a few pairs did bid the slam, and some EW pairs did find the sacrifice and scored over 85%! Sadly, some who did sacrifice in 6S and were doubled were down three.

Why down three when Deep Finesse says EW can make ten tricks?

It looks as though a trump lead and trump continuation will result in declarer losing two hearts and two aces, but sadly for some who had the temerity to bid 6S as a sacrifice, their declarer also turned the top into a bottom, that was the difference between -300 and -500! If you sacrifice, you have to have your wits about you when you end up playing the hand!
