Gold Coast Congress Feb 1 - Feb 6 2025

The congress had six divisions: Open, Intermediate, Restricted, Novice, Rookies, and under 10 masterpoints (similar to under 5 B points in NZ scoring)

About September last year, my sister who plays in the Restricted grade finally convinced us to come over to the biggest congress in the Southern Hemisphere, so we got organized. We played in a few tournaments here and tried to play at the club together as much as possible so that we work on our bidding and make sure we each knew what the other was talking about. Also, we practiced a lot on BBO, and thanks to AJ who often put together a table so that we could practice.

Arriving in Broadbeach on Friday afternoon, we were happy with our prep and tried to cobble together a systems card in case others asked, harder said than done! Saturday morning at about 9am we wander down to the Exhibition Centre, the venue for the event, for a 10am start. We were amazed at the size of the place but found the organization to be so good that we knew where we were to be within 5 minutes of arrival. We were playing in the Novice section (Club master and below in NZ points) so, sat at the purple tablecloth tables for the entire event. 10am, the 88 pairs in novices started, as did the other 1,000+ pairs in the other grades. Day 1 was qualifying for the finals, the top 28 pairs made the 'A' final, the next 28 the 'B' final, the next 16 the 'C' final and the last 16 in 'D' final. Each qualifying round was 9 tables of 3 boards, so 27 boards. Round one of qualifying we finished 6th E/W with 56%, round 2 5th E/W with 60% which allowed us to qualify 5th E/W and 6th overall. We were both absolutely stoked

Sunday, day 2, was two sessions of 27 boards, and Monday was one more session of 27, so that you played every other team in your final group over 3 boards.

Scores were updated on the big screen after every three boards, and after 12 boards we were coming 18th, so not the best of starts. After that we stopped looking—didn't want to know! We did improve and ended up in the first session in 8th place with a score of 54%. The afternoon session went really well for us, scoring 58%, coming 3rd, putting us 4th overall, and in a position to dream! Unfortunately, Monday was not the best of days and we finished 18th in session 3 with our worst score of 48%, but just hung on to 4th overall. Job very well done, we thought, achieving much higher than we thought possible, would have been even higher if lan didn't stuff up Gen's ace asking bid—whoops! The mornings were light from about 5am, temperature was mid to high 20's and we were 100 metres from the beach in our accommodation, so an early morning swim was a must! But the nights were tough—too hot, and absolutely knackered by 8:00pm, thinking is tiring!

Monday afternoon, sadly for dad, was shopping time, and off to the outlet mall we went, happily for Gen!

Tuesday–Thursday was the teams, and the organizers had teamed us up with the team that finished 17th in the pairs, so we knew we would be competitive. Each day was 4 matches of 14 boards. Day one started with three small losses, about 10.5–9.5 and one big loss so we were not that well placed. Around this time Gen was feeling unwell, to the extent that she could not play the last two days of the teams so a fill in was found for me for the last 8 matches, and we won 6 of these to finish with a 6 win, 6 loss record, and 17th of 26.

Overall we played 303 boards over the 6 days, and would both like to go again if the tournament continues.

- Greet others in a friendly manner prior to start of play on each round.
- Be a good "host" or "guest" at the table.
- Make your system card readily available to your opponents and fill it out completely.
- Respond promptly to reasonable and justified enquiries.
- Make bridge enjoyable for yourself, partner & opponents.
 - Give credit when opponents make a good bid or play
 - Take care of your personal grooming.
 - Ensure that your mobile phone is turned off.
 - Enjoy the company as well as the game.

Remember that it is rude to criticise your partner or opponents in public, to be less than polite at the table, to gloat over good results or object, to a call for the tournament director, or to dispute or argue about a director's ruling, or generally to make any personal and disparaging remark.

Kenneth (Ken) Foon Chin

January 7 1957 - December 12 2024

Ken was born in Dunedin and was the eldest of five children. His parents ran restaurants in Dunedin and Ken learned to cook from an early age. His love of food and cooking continued throughout his life and he was well known for his dinner parties as a chef extraordinaire.

However, he was rarely seen at his dinners as he was too busy in the kitchen preparing and cooking the numerous courses.



Ken went to Otago Medical School and became a GP, running his own practice in Taita for over 25 years. He had a strong bond to the local community he served and was well known for working long hours and being available to his patients out of work hours.

He married Malee, a Thai, and they had 2 sons, Garrett (who lives in London) and Jeffrey (who lives in Auckland). He loved racing and was the honorary surgeon to the Wellington Racing Club at Trentham for many years. He would have his two young sons with him most race days. As well as racing he was an able tennis and table tennis player and was a member of the Stokes Valley table tennis club for years. He was also a keen Warriors follower. He used to get treated with VIP status when he went to a casino in Australia or New Zealand.

Ken was a collector. He had a room in his house dedicated to his miniature alcohol collection (mostly whisky), even though he didn't drink alcohol! He also had a stamp collection that consisted of some rare and expensive specimens. His Pokemon collection was also extensive.

Ken was very generous. He was known for buying beautiful and expensive presents for his godchildren and others. Every year he would host a Christmas party for close friends and their partners at the Grand Century Chinese restaurant. He would bring a large chilly bin full of great wines and other beverages. These parties were always full of fun and laughter. The last one was the Sunday night before he died.

We know Ken for his bridge prowess and for his help on the committee. He instigated our fund-raising weekly raffle based on the Lotto bonus ball. As one of his bridge partners I remember his strong play but perhaps even more memorable was the apprehension that his partners developed as you waited for his appearance at the last possible moment.

Ken had not been well for some time. He suffered from kidney and heart disease but he never allowed these to interfere too long from his enjoyment of horse racing and Bridge.
