Helping Ramone to do his work at the club

Thank you for welcoming Ramone and me into the club. I bring Ramone to the club because he helps me pick up things I've dropped. I often drop my keys to the van, and he'll pick them up for me including from in between the foot pedals. This is a really big energy saver for me, especially at the end of bridge.

Ramone is building a lovely relationship with some club members – he enjoys coming to bridge and saying hello to everyone. But he's enjoying it a little too much and isn't focused enough on following his commands.

Ramone recently had his annual licensing assessment. He passed his assessment, but the licensing agency noticed that his 'stay' command is broken. They've recommended I retrain him to 'stay' using a different word.

Ramone needs your help to do his work well at the club.

It's important you ask me first to pat him or to talk to him.

The best time to pat him is before the session starts, at the end of the session, on a break, or if we have finished playing our boards early. It takes energy for me to resettle him, so it's much easier for me if he stays when I've asked him to. It might not look like he's working, but he is.

Thank you for your help!

Thank you also for your help with sorting my cards and being accommodating about using the bidding boxes. These accommodations make a huge difference to me. They significantly reduce my fatigue and pain during bridge and through the next day. It makes bridge fun for me instead of a big physical challenge.

We've created a document that provides some guidance for Directors when they're managing a session at the Hutt Bridge Club. They have an important role hosting and managing the room to make sure everyone enjoys the session, and our Club's values of being welcoming, inclusive and supportive are met.

The new booklet includes guidance and information including:

- how to keep the room moving so players can play as many games as possible
- how to manage Wednesday sessions which are different to other sessions because of number of people still learning the game
- when a player isn't happy with a Director's ruling

Director should attend to any individual player's needs, for example seating rights, pre-sorted cards, bidding aids, and communicate any special arrangements to the room where this is appropriate.

Howell Movement

The Howell movement in Contract Bridge is a logistical marvel, designed to ensure each pair competes against every other pair in a session. Unlike the more static Mitchell movement, where players stay in predictable seats, the Howell movement turns the session into a nomadic adventure.

Each round, players rotate – sometimes shifting seat, and creating a delightful puzzle of organization that leaves even seasoned players checking the movement chart with furrowed brows.

By the end, everyone has faced every opponent, partnerships have been tested, and if nothing else, players get their cardio in by constantly relocating. It's strategy, memory, and navigation rolled into one chaotic masterpiece.

So, when you get to the table please check the BridgeMate to see which seat you should be in.
